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Weston City Attorney to Present \$1,000 Prize To Winning Student of Essay Contest

At the Monday, June 20th Weston City Commission meeting, Cypress Bay High School senior Jesse Mutschler will become \$1,000 richer due to his ability to best express why his city is special.

Between April 13th and May 11th the City's law firm of 12 years, Weiss Serota Helfman Pastoriza Cole & Boniske, P.L., sponsored an essay contest to celebrate its 20th anniversary. The contest was open to any high school senior that was a resident of the city. Students simply had to write an essay, limited to 500 words, on "Why My City Is Special." The prize: a \$1,000 check.

Winning student Jesse Mutschler, who just graduated from Cypress Bay High School will be at the meeting to read his essay and accept his \$1,000 winning prize to be presented by City Attorney Jamie Alan Cole.

The Weston Commission meeting is held at 7:00PM in Weston City Hall located at 17200 Royal Palm Boulevard, Weston, FL 33326.
