



**CITY OF DORAL EMERGENCY ORDER No. 2020-26
AMENDMENT TO EMERGENCY ORDER 2020-22
EXTEND EMERGENCY ORDERS 2020-25, 2020-04 and 2020-05**

WHEREAS, on May 14th, 2020, Governor DeSantis issued executive order 20-122 initiating Phase 1 of the Safe, Smart, Step-by-Step Plan for Florida's Recovery to Miami Dade County; and

WHEREAS, On May 15, 2020, Miami-Dade County issued Emergency Order 23-20 which re-opened various establishments subject to targeted restrictions designed to minimize the risk of spreading COVID-19 while allowing economic activity; and

WHEREAS, on May 18th, 2020, the City of Doral issued Emergency Order 2020-18 moving forward with Phase 1 of the reopening plan and implementing the County's reopening strategy; and

WHEREAS, The County outlined guidance for each business to follow to promote business operation and economic recovery while maintaining focus on core safety principles: and

WHEREAS, the guidance contained in the New Normal Guide was developed in close consultation with medical and industry experts and establish stringent capacity and safety rules in place must be followed: and

WHEREAS, the City Charter grants to the Mayor in a State of Emergency the authority to take actions as may be necessary to protect the lives and health of the residents of the citizens of Doral.



THEREFORE, under the of Section 1.04 of the City Charter, and the home rule powers permitted under the Constitution and laws of the State the City of Doral following will open and implement the County's reopening plan.

Section 1. Re-Opening. The City has adopted the guidance contained in the New Normal Guide and Miami-Dade County Emergency Orders for reopening businesses.

Section 2. Hotels. Hotels welcomed not essential guests on June 1, 2020. Hotels continue to comply with increased cleaning protocols in the rooms, common areas and check-in desks. Guests are required to only congregate with people from the same household. Both guests and workers will also have to wear masks in all common areas. Elevators are limited to 50 percent capacity and marked to show the proper distance among people. Hotel employees are required to undergo training to comply with the new regulations. Valet is an option where onsite parking is available.

Section 3. Swimming Pools. On June 1, 2020, swimming pools opened at hotels, condominiums, apartment buildings and homeowner associations — with strict enforcement of social distancing guidelines and capacity limits.

Section 4. Businesses that must remain closed. Gyms and fitness centers, bars, night clubs, concert houses, banquet halls, breweries, movie theaters, bowling alleys, arcades, massage establishments and summer camps are to remain closed.



Section 5. How an establishment must respond to positive COVID-19 cases.

- a. If an employee tests positive, all employees who were in close contact with the positive employee or contractor must not report for work for 14 days after the date the positive employee was on site; and
- b. the business must be deep sanitized as specified in the New Normal Guide.
- c. the positive employee may not return to work until that employee is cleared by a medical professional as being COVID-19 free.

Section 6. Failure to comply. Failure to comply with this Order shall constitute a misdemeanor subject to fines and imprisonment punishable as provided in F.S. §§ 775.082 and 775.083.

The Emergency measures that have been ordered and promulgated above effective are extended through June 11th, 2020.
